FORWARD THINKING



Planning for Pesach varies from home to home - I have friends that begin preparing after Purim, and others who get to it all the night before Seder. This is a strange time to think about how we prepare. It has been very difficult to plan or think too far into the future for the last year. It is beginning to feel like maybe we could dip our big toe into making some

plans for the coming year, but many understandably feel rather cautious!

But in Jewish time, this is a crucial period of planning. In both Exodus and Leviticus we learn about the idea of sabbatical years – in Hebrew a 'shmittah' year. This was a year that acted as a Shabbat for the land. You weren't allowed to sow or harvest. You could pick or forage what you needed for your own consumption, but you couldn't sell what you gathered. This coming Rosh Hashanah marks the start of the next shmittah year, and I think it's a model we could learn huge amounts from.

In order for the shmittah to really work it took an awful lot of planning. Communities would need to collaborate in the year before to stockpile and prepare for the year to come. During shmittah the land no longer belonged to its inhabitants but to God. So you may own an orange tree, but its produce is not your property in the shmittah year, so anyone could enjoy it. Similarly

if your neighbor had a fig tree, they had to allow you to enjoy its fruit. Sharing and collaborating meant communities could enjoy a varied diet.

This process could also be seen as acting as a corrective to any social injustice; in the shmittah year no one owned what they thought of as theirs, and the focus would switch from what one wants, to what one really needs. Other features of the shmittah year included debt forgiveness and the freeing of slaves.

It is unclear to what extent the shmittah was fully practiced in the land of Israel, though there are communities who zealously observe parts of it today. But for us as a community outside the land of Israel, there are a lot of lessons to be learned about looking after the needs of all, sharing what we have with one another, considering who our slaves are, and reminding ourselves that nothing, the earth included, can endlessly produce on demand without rest and regeneration.

We could easily dismiss shmittah as an ancient nonsense. Yet as we begin to think towards how we might return to being together physically as well as electronically, Jewish time calls on us to reflect. The coming shmittah that begins with Rosh Hashanah in September, is a powerful reminder that we need to be careful in our planning, thoughtful in how we look after one another, and mindful of creating longevity rather than endlessly demanding more and more from our worlds resources. It asks us to think communally and not only individually, and I'm so looking forward to doing that with the EHRS family.

This session is currently on Zoom and is suitable for all children of that age in the community whether they go to Jewish Day School or not. And here's to the future when we can start to offer live events at EHRS. But a positive to come out of lock downs is that technology has given us new ways to do things to help keep our members stay connected and involved and has made us more accessible to members who may not easily get to events at EHRS. It has led to more people attending, particularly our ATJ events. We cancelled few planned programmes and even added more to our schedule.

amazing volunteers who continue supporting so many members and finally we wish everyone in our community Chag Sameach.



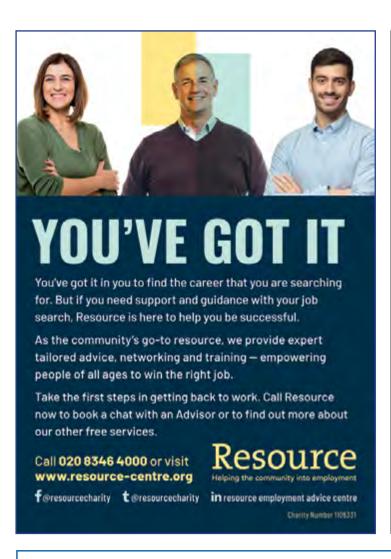

Welcome Rabbi Roberta Harris-Eckstein

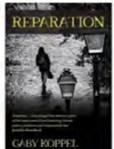

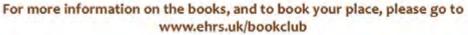

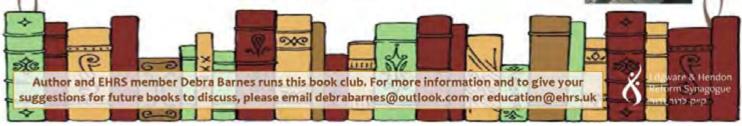

COMMISSIONING A TORAH SCROLL IN THE NAME OF OUR DEAR RABBI NEIL KRAFT Z"L

In just a few weeks, we will be commemorating the yahrzeit of Rabbi Neil Kraft z''l, who as you will all recall, passed away from Covid-19 towards the end of March last year.

The Synagogue Council has agreed that it would like to commission a Torah Scroll in Rabbi Kraft's name, as a lasting memorial to this much loved rabbi.

We very much want contributions for this Scroll to come from our community and from friends of Rabbi Kraft. This would ensure that on any occasion we entered the sanctuary during a Shabbat or a Chag and saw this Scroll especially written to honour Rabbi Kraft's name that we would appreciate that the donations had come directly from the community he served for nearly 20 years. We are able to commission the writing of a new Torah Scroll for £30,000. That cost will increase as it is likely that a mantle for the Scroll will need to be designed, and we will also need to purchase bells (rimmonim), and a yad etc. The total cost would be approximately £35,000. We would love our members to sponsor part of the writing of the Scroll, and suggested amounts are as follows:

A letter would cost £1 A word would cost £5

A verse would cost £30 (if you wish to choose a particular verse the cost would be £50)

A chapter would cost £100

An entire portion/sedrah would cost £600

One of the Five Books of Moses would cost £6000.

Obviously, any other donations would be greatly and very much appreciated.

We are hopeful that those who celebrated their Bar/Bat Mitzvah (or their family) with Rabbi Kraft may wish to donate, as well as those who were married by him. It is possible that those who have lost loved ones, for whom Rabbi Kraft officiated at the funeral would also like to contribute. Rabbi Kraft also helped many of our members through the conversion process and we envisage that some of those members may wish to contribute.



Those who wish to donate have a choice. 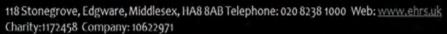

Would you like to be involved and help the UK Jewish community as an EHRS deputy for the Board of Deputies?

The Board of Deputies of British Jews is the democratic, representative voice of British Jews, working on behalf of the community. It is the first port of call for the Government, the media and those seeking to understand the Jewish community's interests and concerns. The Board of Deputies is cross-communal and speaks with unparalleled legitimacy.

EHRS are entitled to send 6 deputies as representatives of our community and will be holding elections for the deputies in early 2021.

What are the Deputies' key roles?

Representation

The Board's democratically elected Deputies span the religious, political & geographical range of British Jewry. Deputies are representative of their constituencies to the Board and representative of the Board to their constituencies, and address issues that affect the community on the local and national stage. EHRS' deputies are responsible for representing and promoting our interests, and keeping the community informed of relevant discussions.

Expertise, Engagement and Education

Deputies share their professional expertise and getting involved in contributing to policy development. Deputies have the opportunity to get involved in local Jewish life, sharing the BoD's position on relevant issues – Deputies help to power the Board's campaigns and projects including Yom HaShoah, the Jewish Living Experience, and the Board's Social Action Forum.

Involvement

As a minimum, you will be expected to attend 9 or 10 plenary meetings each year which are usually held on Sunday in central London (or more recently, online). You are encouraged to get more involved by speaking at meetings, joining committees and working groups, and contributing to Board policy.

Deputies can put themselves forward to be elected to the Board's divisions, spanning key areas of its remit: namely International, Defence, Community, Education and Interfaith, and Finance & Organisation. Deputies also elect and stand to be elected to the Senior Lay Leadership roles that shape the strategic direction of the Board
